CORE AND RECOVERY GRANTS

[Arnold Clark Community Fund](#)

Charities, community and voluntary groups, CICs, CIOs, and social enterprises across the UK that have been significantly affected by the coronavirus pandemic can apply for funding of up to £1,000 to support local communities during the winter months. The Arnold Clark Community Fund will accept applications from organisations working to support food banks, toy banks, poverty relief, and housing and accommodation. Only one application will be accepted per organisation and applicants will be randomly selected at the end of each month to receive funding. Applications that are unsuccessful one month will be kept in the draw for the following month. The final deadline for applications is the 31st December 2021.

[Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust \(UK\)](#) Force for Change programme

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for community projects supporting Armed Forces communities. In particular, funding is available to support Armed Forces communities to become less isolated and engage more in their local area, and to support needs that have arisen as a result of the **Covid-19 pandemic**. To be eligible to apply, the applicant organisation must be an established registered charity or Community Interest Company (CIC) with substantial recent experience of supporting Armed Forces communities; an Armed Forces unit or base; a local authority; or a school. The funding is being made available through the Armed Forces Covenant Fund's Force for Change programme.

[Volant Trust Covid-19 Response Fund](#)

The Volant Trust has announced that its Covid-19 Response Fund has opened for applications. The Trust is accepting applications from registered charities, community interest companies, community organisations or social enterprises in the UK and internationally that demonstrate a strong focus on alleviating social deprivation and helping vulnerable groups who have been particularly impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. Funding is available to support running and core costs as well as for medical equipment and the production or distribution of PPE will also be considered.

There are no funding levels indicated at the award of grants will be at the discretion of the Trustees. The closing date for applications is the 31st December 2021. Further Details [Here](#)

[Support Adoption for Pets Grant Programme](#)

Pet rescue organisations can apply for funding to help support rescues throughout the short- and medium-term impact of the coronavirus. Through the Support Adoption for Pets Grant Programme, charities and not-for-profit organisations which rescue and rehome pets or provide temporary support to ensure pets can remain with their owners can apply for funding of up to £10,000 or up to 30% of total annual expenditure, whichever is the lower amount. Funding must have a direct impact on animal welfare and can be used to cover vet bills, boarding costs, food, salaries of animal care staff, utilities and consumables. Priority will be given to organisations whose medium-term survival is at risk. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis. Further information [here](#)

[UK Insurance and Long-Term Savings Industry Covid-19 Support Fund](#)

The UK insurance and long-term savings industry has launched the Covid-19 Support Fund to help support some of the people hardest hit by the Covid-19 crisis. The Covid-19 Support Fund aims to raise £100 million, with £82.6 million already having been pledged in voluntary contributions from firms within the sector. The Fund will work in partnership with the Charities Aid Foundation, and a network of partners, including the National Emergencies Trust. The key aim is to provide immediate relief to charities affected by Covid-19, as well as a longer-term programme of support for people, communities, and issues where there is the greatest need. CONSERVATION and ENVIRONMENT

[Trees Call to Action Fund](#)

Environmental charities, not-for-profits, local authorities and protected landscape bodies are invited to apply for a share of a new £6 million fund aimed at planting more trees, creating jobs and improving access to nature across the country.

The Trees Call to Action Fund opens for expressions of interest on Wednesday 3 November until noon on 16 November, and will be delivered by the [National Lottery Heritage Fund](#) in partnership with Defra and the Forestry Commission. Grants of £250,000 to £500,000 are available for projects across England

Funding will be targeted at regions, activities and costs that are not supported by other government funding for trees, aiming to increase community understanding of and access to trees and woodlands, and boost efforts to increase woodland cover in areas that need it most.

The fund will also support projects to engage people with trees, create new jobs and develop skills and knowledge, such as through developing training and placement programmes for new foresters and woodland managers.

The [Green Innovation Fund](#) is seeking Expressions of Interest from projects which take an innovative approach to tackling climate change and helping Devon reach Net Zero. Devon County Council is looking to invest in clean growth projects; ideas and actions which support post-Covid recovery and boost Devon's economy in a way that is sustainable and aligns with the goals of the

[The DPD Eco Fund](#) seeks to support local organisations that are delivering green projects and environment-friendly initiatives.

Grants of up to £2,000 are available. Each application must be accompanied by a quote(s) for the goods or services for which the donation is going to be used.

DPD particularly encourages applications on behalf of schools and educational facilities across the UK working on green projects with their students, and start-up companies working on developing environmentally friendly products.

[National Heritage Memorial Fund Covid-19 Response Fund](#)

Charities, not-for-profit and public sector organisations can apply for funding to help save nationally important heritage assets at risk of loss due to the impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

The National Heritage Memorial Fund's Covid-19 Response Fund will support a broad range of heritage, from fine and decorative arts to museum collections and archives, historic buildings and land, and items of industrial, transport and maritime heritage. £20 million is available to support UK organisations, with an additional £20 million available to those in England. Funding could be used to support acquisition costs, urgent conservation work, and fixed term support to enable heritage assets to be sustainably rehomed.

Applications for National Lottery Grants for Heritage have re-opened for applications. The focus for 2021 – 22 will be to support projects that will strengthen the recovery of the Heritage sector from the Covid-19 pandemic. The National Lottery Heritage Fund will award grants of between £3,000 and £5 million to not-for-profit organisations and private owners of heritage across the UK. Priority will now be given to heritage projects that: boost the local economy; encourage skills development and job creation; support wellbeing; create better places to live, work and visit; and improve the resilience of heritage organisations. [Sport England Return to Play - Active Together Fund](#)

An additional £5 million of National Lottery funding has been made available to continue supporting clubs and local organisations to set up and run their own crowdfunding campaigns to help sustain them through the Covid-19 pandemic and return to play. Sport England's Return to Play: Active

Together Fund is a crowdfunding initiative that can match fund successful Crowdfunder campaigns by up to £10,000. Sports clubs, charities and other community organisations delivering sport or activity in England are invited to run their own crowdfunding campaigns, fundraising for things such as a loss of income due to the crisis, additional coaching, facility hire, and any other Covid-19 related needs. [Sport England Return to Play: Small Grants Fund](#)

Sport and activity groups, clubs and organisations in England can apply for grants of up to £10,000 to respond to the immediate challenges of returning to play in a coronavirus-safe way. The funding which is being made available through the Sport England Return to Play: Small Grants Fund and can cover costs such as minor amendments to facilities, additional sports equipment, signage, sanitation and training courses for clubs in areas of high deprivation, the Fund will now also support ongoing running costs. COMMUNITY, HEALTH and WELLBEING

The National Lottery Community Fund have released details of their [Platinum Jubilee Funding programme](#).

To mark Her Majesty the Queen's 70th (Platinum) Jubilee, The National Lottery Community Fund will make funding available to 70 projects across the UK. This is a significant National moment, and we are looking for projects that go beyond simply celebrating it. Instead, we want to fund projects aligned to one or more of our three areas of focus:

1. **Across Generations** - Strengthening relationships between generations and creating a legacy for future generations.
2. **Community Renewal** - Supporting new opportunities for people to develop skills and experiences in their local community, as well as opportunities to bring people together in new ways, and in new or different places and spaces.
3. **Our Shared Natural World** - Deepening our care and action locally for the natural world.

Funded projects will need to be up and running by Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Central Weekend on the 5 June 2022. We plan to make our final decisions on which projects to fund in Spring 2022. So, we would expect the projects we fund under this programme to start in Spring 2022 onwards.

Funding programme key facts:

- Opens to applications on Wednesday 17 November 2021 and closes at 5pm on Wednesday 15 December, unless 700 applications are received sooner
- Available UK wide but projects do not need to be operating across the UK
- £3.5m is available and we'll be offering grants of between £30,000 - £50,000
- 70 projects will receive funding
- Funded projects will have up to 2 years to deliver their activities from award

- Will not cover capital costs

The Platinum Jubilee Fund will offer eligible groups funding for activities that meet at least two of the following criteria:

- connects people across generations through doing activities together
- makes use of significant local sites or spaces – parks, heritage buildings, community spaces etc.
- considers future generations and how the Jubilee can leave a legacy for them in the community
- creates new opportunities for the people that live locally to contribute and/or to build skills and experience
- starts something new (a set of activities, a group, a community space, a service, a network) that marks the Jubilee as a turning point in the community
- is designed and led by young people who want to be more active in shaping the future of their communities
- starts collective action in relation to the natural world locally - giving more people the opportunity to care for the planet at a local level

[The Foyle Foundation Small Grants Scheme](#)

The Foyle Foundation has re-opened its Small Grants Scheme to support smaller, grass-roots and local charities across the UK during the Covid-19 crisis. Organisations which are currently delivering services to the young, vulnerable, elderly, disadvantaged or the general community either directly or through online support can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £10,000. Funding can be used to cover core costs or essential equipment, to enable ongoing service provision, homeworking, or delivery of online digital services for charities with a turnover of less than £150,000 per annum that can show financial stability and a clear need for their services. Competition for funding is expected to be strong. Applications can be submitted at any time. Further Information [Here](#)

The [Comic Relief Community Fund for England](#) is a 3-year grant programme managed by Groundwork UK on behalf of Comic Relief. The programme is designed to support community-led organisations in England to deliver change by drawing on the 'lived experiences' of people and communities who meet one or more of Comic Relief's four overarching strategic priorities:

1. A Safe Place to Be – supporting those who have been displaced to access secure housing and feel settled in their new homes.
2. Children Survive and Thrive – ensuring every child has the best start in life.
3. Fighting for Gender Justice – tackling gender-based violence, inequality and exploitation, **and/or**
4. Mental Health Matters – helping people with poor mental health to access appropriate support.

Grants up to £10,000 are available with no matched funding requirement, providing Comic Relief is the major funder in the project.

To apply, organisations are required to initially complete an online **Eligibility Checker**. Organisations that pass the Eligibility Check will then be given access to an online application form.

The Fund has a single application deadline for each of the next three years:

1. Round 1 is currently open to applications with a deadline of Friday 12 November 2021 for consideration at the Grants Panel meeting in February 2022.
2. Round 2 will open in March 2022 and close in June 2022. Panel meetings are expected in September 2022.
3. Round 3 will open in October 2022 and close in January 2023. Panel meetings are expected in March 2023.

The **Youth Endowment Fund (YEF)** provides funding for projects to prevent children and young people becoming involved in violence. The YEF is working with Comic Relief for this funding round which has a theme of 'A supportive home: helping families to overcome challenges.'

Grants are available for projects that help families and carers to create a supportive home environment for 6- to 14-year-old children (or children aged up to 18 years old if they are in the care system), reducing the likelihood of them becoming involved in violence.

Through this round, the YEF is interested in four types of family support:

1. Parenting programmes (including programmes for foster carers or people working with children in residential care), which help parents and their children to develop positive behaviours and relationships.
2. Family therapy interventions (including for children in foster care), which offer whole families structured forms of therapy.
3. Programmes to reduce parental conflict, which are specifically designed to improve relationships between parents or carers.
4. Domestic abuse interventions, which are specifically designed to prevent and reduce harm to children and adults

Applications can be made by all types of

organisation in the public, private and voluntary sectors. You must be a registered legal entity such as a registered charity, company, statutory body or CIC.

Through this round, the YEF intends to spend between £6 million to £10 million in total on funding five to ten projects. Further Information [here](#)

Morrisons Foundation

Grant funding for charity projects which make a positive difference in local communities .From support groups to children's hospitals and homeless shelters to hospices, the grants aim to provide vital funding for good causes.

Registered charities are eligible to apply. In the main, grants are available to fully fund projects up to £25,000. The funding is for new projects charities would like to get off the ground but for which they have no funding. You can apply anytime – more details [HERE](#)

[The Weavers' Company](#)

Small registered charities can apply for grants of up to £15,000 for projects working with young offenders; prisoners and ex-prisoners as well as young disadvantaged people at risk of criminal involvement.

To be eligible for funding, local organisations such as those working in a village, estate or small town should normally have an income of less than £100,000. Those working across the UK or in larger areas should normally have an income of not more than £250,000. Grants are usually given for one year.

LORD BARNBY'S CHARITABLE FOUNDATION DISCRETIONARY GRANTS - Grants up to £12,000 are available to UK registered charities for a diverse range of charitable causes.

During the year ended 31 March 2020, the Foundation awarded 77 grants totalling £313,000. Grants ranged from £500 to £12,000, with an average award of £4,065

The Archer Trust is a UK Christian charitable grant-making trust, set up in 1994 in memory of Ronnie Archer, who rose through the ranks of Unilever to become Vice-Chairman. It is hoped that the Archer Trust will be a fitting memorial to a talented but modest man.

If you meet the following criteria, they may be able to help you:

- You are a small UK charity for whom a grant of between £250 and £3,000 will make a big difference.

- In one way or another, you provide aid or support to a defined group of needy or deserving people, for instance those with physical or mental disabilities or the disadvantaged.
- You are competently run and can support your application with up-to-date accounts.

The Trust prefer to support organisations working in areas of high unemployment and deprivation. They favour charities which make good use of volunteers. The Trust support projects both in the UK and overseas, but for overseas projects only via UK charities which can ensure that funds are being well used.

Application Form: Apply in writing.

Deadline: Applications can be submitted at any time, however replies may take some time because the trustees only meet twice a year, normally in March and September.

[The Wakeham Trust](#) provides grants to help people rebuild their communities. They are particularly interested in neighbourhood projects, community arts projects, projects involving community service by young people, or projects set up by those who are socially excluded.

The Trust also supports innovative projects to promote excellence in teaching (at any level, from primary schools to universities), though it never support individuals. They aim to refresh the parts that other funding sources can't reach, especially new ideas and unpopular causes. Because they do not appeal to the public for funds, they can take risks.

They favour small projects - often, but not always, start-ups and they try to break the vicious circle whereby you have to be established to get funding from major charities, but you have to get funding to get established. The Trust does not favour any particular areas of activity.
